## Annual Report: January to December 2006

### Part A

Dear Honorable Members,

It is my great privilege to present before you the annual report for 2006 of our esteemed branch. The IAP Delhi has accomplished a successful year 2006. A host of activities were organized during the year and now time has come to script the achievements accomplished during the year and put them in the annals of the IAP Delhi for future beckoning. I am happy to present the honorable members the first ever printed annual report. This report contains messages from CIAP Presidents, a brief on IAP Delhi State Branch, an account of activities carried out during past one year and statement of the financial health of the organization.

### *IAP Delhi*

The Indian Academy of Pediatrics has closely linked with the development of the Pediatric Specialty in Delhi. In the 40's Delhi has 2 Pediatricians. During 1949, the leading pediatricians of Delhi met at the office of Dr K L Jain on Thursday afternoon. These pediatricians mostly were Members of the Association of Physicians of India. In that first meeting of pediatrician, the idea of forming an Association of pediatricians of India was mooted. It is interesting to observe that the present practice of our Thursday Meetings seems to have its roots in that first meeting held on a Thursday.

In 1954, the Association of pediatricians of India was christened and it established its Central office at Bombay. The Delhi State Branch came into being in 1964.

The first Department of Pediatrics was created at the Irwin (Now LNJP Hospital) Hospital and Dr P N Taneja joined as Head of Department in 1952. The Kalawati Saran Children's Hospital came up in 1956 and Dr Sheila Singh Paul was its Head of The department. The next pediatric Department was established at the Safdarjung Hospital in 1957-59 with Dr A K Basu as its Head. The pediatrics Department in AIIMS was started in 1958. Meetings in late fifties were mostly held in these hospitals.

In 1996, IAP Delhi registered under Societies Act of 1986 and purchased its office premises at Ansari Road Dariyaganj, New Delhi. It has its own constitution and rules and regulations to govern it and following **Aims and Objectives** to accomplish:

1. To encourage and advance the knowledge, Study and practice of the science of Pediatrics and of Child Care in all possible ways.
2. To promote scientific collaboration of its members for better child care.
3. To establish and maintain libraries, reading rooms, laboratories and research centers for the promotion of its objectives.
4. To organize, establish, conduct, superintend or control institutions of Delhi for promotion directly or indirectly the practice, study and research in the Pediatrics and child care or in any of its aspects.
5. To provide facilities to students, Scholars and Institutions for the study and research in the Pediatrics or in any aspects of it by way of scholarships, Fellowships, grants or endowments.
6. To found, maintain award, either itself or in cooperation with other bodies, person, prizes and awards.
7. To Print and publish an official Bulletin of the society, book, periodicals or publications on Pediatrics, Child Care and allied subjects for promotion of its objects.
8. To train up personnel for carrying out the objectives of the society and to incur necessary expenses for the purpose.
9. To organize conferences, lectures, meetings, seminars, symposia, exhibitions for promotion of its objects.

10. To consider and express its views on all questions affecting child health in India and to study, suggest, criticize or otherwise advise or take part in the framing of laws affecting the science and practice of Pediatrics.
11. To appoint officers and other staff as may be found necessary or convenient for the conduct and management of the affairs of the society and pay them such remuneration as may be prescribed from time to time.

**Current Membership of IAP Delhi:**

The IAP Delhi carried out a special drive this year to increase its strength. A list of the Pediatricians practicing in Delhi was procured from Delhi Medical Council. Both list of DMC and IAP members were matched and the Pediatricians who are not members of IAP were contacted by IAP office to motivate them to become member of IAP Delhi. Consequently, IAP Delhi increased its membership significantly this year and first time it crossed four figures. Present Membership strength is:

**Privileges of the Members:**

The memorandum of association of the IAP Delhi guarantees following privileges to its members.

1. To receive the official bulletin of the Society free of cost and other publications free of the cost or at reduced prizes as may be framed time to time and determine by the executive board.
2. To attend meeting and conferences arranged or organized by the Society.
3. To use reading rooms and libraries maintained by the society and to consult and use the books and periodicals in the library at such time and on such conditions as may be prescribed by the regulations made by the Executive board.
4. All the members shall have right to participate in all activities of the Society as per rules and regulations.
5. All the life and ordinary members are entitled to be elected to executive Board of the Society and right to take part in the elections or vote any meeting of the Society.

### **Constitution of Committees:**

The Executive Board of Indian Academy of Pediatrics Delhi has constituted the following committees to enhance the activities and to fulfill its aspirations under Chapter III of its "Memorandum of Association". The committees constitute under provisions mentioned in the Chapter IV, section 20 of IAP Delhi Constitution..

- A. **Committee to prepare and publish a compendium & Vision Document for IAP Delhi**
- B. **Committee to recommend awards, appreciation and fellowship programs for members**
- C. **Committee to work on Child Friendly Delhi Initiative**
- D. **Committee to conduct CME programs for doctors working in the peripheral Hospital/Dispensaries/Private Practitioners**

These committees have been made functional and most of them have their introductory meetings to formulate the strategy, policy and have planned their line of action to achieve the goals and objectives assigned to them.

### **Dengue Outbreak and IAP Delhi Response:**

IAP Delhi responded to Dengue Outbreak and wrote to Delhi Government and MCD to introduce winter dress in schools to prevent the Mosquito bites in School children. The Government of Delhi accepted the demand and issued circular to all schools. The all branches requested to organize School awareness programs in Schools in their area. The IAP Delhi in collaboration of Center for Child Health, Sir Ganga Ram Hospital has organized a CME on 7-10-2006 in Women's Hostel, SGRH with help of Dr Anupam Sachdeva. A large number of Members participated.

### **HIV and Infant Feeding:**

The IAP Delhi in collaboration of BPNI has organized five CMEs in all zones of the Delhi successfully for pediatricians, Obstetricians, Community Medicine and nurses. The objective was to educate the doctors about HIV and infant Feeding problems.

### **Central IAP Activities undertaken by IAP Delhi:**

#### **(A) North Zone Workshop on Comprehensive management of Diarrhoea and Malnutrition.**

The North Zone Workshop on Comprehensive Management of Diarrhoea and Malnutrition under IAP Action Plan 2006 was organized on 6<sup>th</sup> August, 2006 at Sitaram Bhartia Institute of Science & Research, New Delhi. IAP Delhi has sponsored 25 members to participate in it.

#### **(B) North Zone Workshop on Management Protocol for Level II neonatal care.**

The North Zone Workshop on Management Protocol for Level II Neonatal Care under IAP Action Plan 2006 was organized on 17<sup>th</sup> September, 2006 at Apollo Hospital, Sarita Vihar, New Delhi. 25 (Twenty Five) IAP Delhi Members were sponsored to participate in it.

- (C) **ASK IAP Workshop** was organized on November 2, 2006 and 60-70 members participated. It was supported by Dr Reddy's Lab
- (D) **Immunization Update** was organized on November 30, 2006 at Maulana Azad Medical College and about 60 delegates participated.
- (E) **CME for Family Physicians** was organized at VVMC and SJH on December 2, 2006. Approximately 70-80 members participated. This CME was organized to sensitize and update the doctors working at dispensary and Peripheral Hospitals. About 15 Doctors from Delhi Government run dispensary had participated.
- (F) **RTI Management Protocols Workshop** has been planned on December 23, 2006 at KSCH.
- (G) **10<sup>th</sup> IAP Quiz for Private Practitioners 2006:** IAP Delhi has organized this quiz at local and state level and sent a team to participate in Zonal round to be held during Annual Function at Maulana Azad Medical College on December 17, 2006.

(H) IAP Delhi also involved in organizing North Zone **Under Graduate Quiz** being held at VVMC and SJH

(I) **Parent Education Program:** Two parent education programs were organized on 14<sup>th</sup> May 2006.

***Disease Outbreak Response Committee:***

The IAP Delhi executive board has constituted a “**disease outbreak response committee**” of doctors under chairmanship of Dr (Prof.) A K Dutta, Director Professor, Head of Department of Pediatrics, Kalawati Saran Children’s Hospital, Lady Hardinge Medical College, New Delhi. The members are drawn from doctors who are directly or indirectly associated and worked in outbreak situations, Eminent Pediatricians, IAP Infectious Disease Chapter, NICD, Health Ministry, MCD and AIIMS. This committee will be responsible to formulate the guidelines, policy documents, advice measures to control disease outbreaks, educate public and media briefings etc.

**ORS and Breast Feeding Week Celebrations:**

**ORS Week and Day Celebrations:**

The IAP Delhi organized “IAP ORS WEEK and ORS Day” from 25-31 July, 2006 and World Breast feeding Week from 1-7<sup>th</sup> August, 2006 with help of ***Branches and Institutions***.

North Branch organized a painting competition on ORS Theme was organized with help of Dr Reddy’s Lab at DPS Public School Sector 24, Rohini, Delhi on July 25, 2006 and a lecture on Diarrhea management. ORS preparation method demonstrated to teachers and students. A Brief Press talk on ORS on diarrhea and its management was given by Dr. Chander Kant and Dr. Tarsem Jindal, relayed by Delhi Aaj Tak. IEC material on ORS also distributed to Parents, Teachers and Students.

The Department of Pediatrics, Kasturba Hospital, municipal Corporation of Delhi celebrated ORS week from 25<sup>th</sup> to 31<sup>st</sup> July. 2006. Dr Sunita Bhatia delivered a health talk for doctors, residents, nurses and the mothers were educated about ORS preparation and rehydration therapy.

ORS Week was celebrated in ESI Hospital Jhilmil in collaboration with IAP Delhi. Public health awareness program for 10 minutes were conducted in Pediatric OPD and issues related to diarrhea, Nutrition during diarrhea, home based ORS were discussed and parental queries & concerns were directly addressed by Dr Sapna Mittal.

West Delhi organized a talk on role of Zinc and management of diarrhea in children at Mata Chanan Devi Hospital. Dr S K Mittal delivered the talk.

Pediatric residents of Batra Hospital & Medical Research Centre, New Delhi went to the market places around the hospital and gave small talk shows to the public explained the importance of ORS, method of preparing ORS and the precautions.

**Breast Feeding Week:**

**East Delhi organized a** public awareness program on breastfeeding for Swatambar Jain Terapanth Mahila Mandal at Oswal Bhavan. Dr.L.N.Taneja convenor of the program explained the benefit of exclusive breast milk feeding for 6 month and then introduction of complementary foods to child besides breast feeding. He stressed on home made food for complementary feeding. The IMS Act its contents, articles banned, its implementation and punishment for violators were explained to audience.

Dr. M.M.A.Faridi, President Delhi I.A.P. and Head Deptt of Pediatrics, UCMS & GTB Hospital not only explained the benefit of breast feeding to the infants and children; but also the gain to the mothers who breastfeed them. He answered questions raised by the ladies attending the program. He focused his talk on IMS Act and advantages of breast Feeding.

Dr. Sapna Mittal, Head of Deptt of Pediatrics, ESI Jhilmil, Delhi arranged a VCD on Breast feeding from BPNI, which was shown at OPD Foyer. On the Antenatal day the same was shown in the Obstetrics & Gynae OPD and on two occasions it was shown in post-natal ward. After that a question answer session was conducted wherein all their doubts were cleared. Most questions were related to “not having enough milk”. Pamphlets on breast-feeding were distributed to the mothers. A 10 min. discussion cum interactive session on breast-feeding and IMS Act for Nurses was also held in the Library.

The Department of Pediatrics, Kasturba Hospital, Municipal Corporation observed Breastfeeding week. Special arrangements were made to create awareness regarding breast feeding amongst antenatal as well as postnatal mothers. Dr Duggal organized a seminar on 4.8.06 for medical and paramedical staff on breast feeding and IMS Act. This program was well attended.

Lecture-cum- discussion was organized by North Delhi Branch on 1st August, 2006, sponsored by Ministry of Women & Child Development and Food & Nutrition Board, Government of India. The Topic for discussion was “The IMS Act – Making it known to the people” at Rural Health Training Centre, Najafgarh Road, Delhi. Dr. Chander Kant, delivered a lecture on “Optimum Infant and young child feeding and Dr. Tarsem Jindal, spoke about “Violation of IMS Act” by Baby food manufacturers/Industries and penalties under the Act.

Breast Feeding Week was celebrated in another unique way. The DNB residents with nursing students and staff nurses were asked to give talk shows to the expectant and new mothers in the OPD block of Batra Hospital & Medical Research Centre, New Delhi

### Involvement with Government/WHO/UNICEF in programs like PPI, CSSM, UIP, ARI etc

The IAP Delhi has included Immunization and Nutrition Week in its activities for the year 2006. After a series of meetings with Director Family Welfare, Govt of Delhi, it is decided that every year the special immunization week in March will be observed in association with IAP Delhi.
